



Ohio History Connection Hosts Updates on Downtown Caldwell Historic District Project

The Ohio History Connection, Ohio's nominating authority to the National Register of Historic Places Program with the US Park Service, recently hosted an update on the application process for the Downtown Caldwell Historic District Project.

Brett Carmichael, MA, an architectural historian and archaeologist with Lawhon & Associates, engaged by project coordinator RVC Architects, has worked diligently to research and craft the Caldwell district's application for consideration by The Ohio Historical Sites Preservation Advisory Board on Dec. 6. "We want the community and the district's property owners to understand the benefits of the program," Susan Tietz, National Register and Inventory Manager for Inventory & Registration with The Ohio History Connection, said. "There's really no downside to this effort."

The project was a dream of

Jeff Minosky, a member of the Caldwell Village Council and of The Noble County Historical Society. Assisting Minosky, Gwynn Stewart, community development educator with Ohio State University Extension, applied for and secured a \$12,000 pipeline grant through the Ohio Development Services Agency to cover the costs of the research and application process.

The district is in downtown Caldwell with the Noble County Courthouse Square at the center and commercial areas surrounding. The application features the area's significance to the growth of Caldwell and to Noble County, as well as buildings of significance in their architectural merit.

If the application is accepted in December, additional Ohio processes may be necessary before it is submitted for final consideration by the U.S. Park Service, a process that then takes 45 additional days.

Superintendent Kasey Cottrill's Contract Renewed at Caldwell

In other business, Superintendent Cottrill recognized Mary Pangle and Jane Smith for their years of service to the district and wished them well on their retirement. Dave Hansen representing the Moose Lodge 221, was recognized for donations totaling over \$31,000 to the district.
