

Dear Readers,

I have been asked multiple times to host an edible wild plant workshop and as the questions trickle in about wild edibles, I feel compelled to explain why the suggested workshop hasn't been offered yet.

Many are interested in identifying and collecting edibles, but this is a hobby that should be pursued with extreme caution. Hence, the hesitation to start a workshop. The risk of accidental consumption of a harmful plant following an event like that is too great. The most responsible overall advice I can give you about consuming wild edibles is, don't do it. Unless you are stranded in the wilderness and need to survive on wild edibles, the risk vs. reward odds are not worth testing.

Collecting wild edibles is an endeavor that could start out with good intentions and end in the hospital, or worse. Before you eat any plant or fungus you find in the wild, check, check, and check again to verify it is what you think. Many edibles seem perfectly safe just by looking at them, but don't forget that there are other factors like pathogens or parasites that could make you ill that are unable to be seen, so eat at your own risk.

If you determine it is "safe" to eat, only consume a tiny bit at a time, just in case something goes haywire. Also, keep an unaltered sample of what you have consumed, so that medical personnel could implement the appropriate treatment in an emergency. Remember that some wild edibles, like ginseng, are illegal to collect from state lands in OH. Permits can be acquired in some areas during the designated season for harvest. Don't forget that in some wildlife areas, removal of ANY vegetation is illegal.

Keep this flyer in an easily accessible place! If you witness an oil or gas emergency notify your local fire department and the Ohio Department of Natural Resources Division of Oil & Gas. Turn this page over for a list of incidents that should be reported.



The new toll-free number is: 1-844-OHCALL1 (1-844-642-2551).

A reporting party is required to make a call to the Ohio One-Call System within 30-minutes after becoming aware of the occurrence, unless notification within that time is impracticable under the circumstances.

This requirement does not change current federal/SERC regulations for 30 minute notification to local fire department and LEPC.

In addition, calls to The National Response Center (NRC) shall be made for those reportable quantity releases involving CERCLA hazardous substances or oil to navigable waters as soon as possible. The National Response Center (NRC) 24-hour number is 1-800-424-8802.

ODNR's 24-hour dispatching center will receive all calls made to **1-844-OHCALL1** and makes notifications to the below agencies.

The Ohio One Call System Notifies:

- ODNR Division of Oil and Gas Resources Management
- ODC/ State Fire Marshal
- OEPA
- PUCO
- ODNR WILDLIFE

Once ODNR has fulfilled its initial notification of oil and gas emergency, each respective department or agency is responsible for making its own internal notifications and deploying its resources and personnel to respond to the emergency, as needed.



Updates on Current Agricultural Use Value (CAUV)

Noble County is one of 41 Ohio counties set to have CAUVs reappraised in 2017. Voices across Ohio have spoken up to say that the current system makes assumptions that do not accurately assess land use. This has led to over taxation for many in recent years.

Under the current system, land that is used for conservation efforts is often misrepresented under CAUV. This actually penalizes farmers who are dedicating space to conservation rather than pushing it to max yield potential. In the end, this hurts both farmers and conservation agencies.

According to Ohio Farm Bureau, counties that have been reappraised since 2015 have seen an average of \$10 in tax savings per acre. Savings vary by taxing district depending on local factors. Overall, hopes are high that pending CAUV reform will put dollars back in farmer's pockets and in turn, encourage conservation efforts across the state.
