A Day in the Woods Programs at Vinton Furnace State Forest-June 14

The "A Day in the Woods" series is offered on the second Friday of the month from May through November with topics related to forestry. The next program is on June 14. Most folks are familiar with white-tailed deer, wild turkey and many of the critters that they regularly see in their woodlands, but there are many other wildlife species that are a bit more elusive. Gray tree frogs, flying squirrels, redback salamanders, gray ratsnakes and many other wildlife species are frequently present in our local woodlands, but they often go unnoticed. Join Don Althoff, (University of Rio Grande), Kaylin Callander (Lake Hope State Park), Laura Kearns (ODNR-Division of Wildlife) and Lindsay Rist (ODNR-Division of Wildlife) on June 14 to learn where and when to look for these fascinating critters.

You'll also learn about their life histories and the habitat needs. This program will take place from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the Vinton Furnace State Forest, near McArthur, OH. A \$12 registration entitles participants to lunch and program materials. Ohio Intermediate & Advanced Sheep Shearing School-July 27 & 28

In addition to the annual spring and fall sheep shearing schools sponsored by the Ohio Sheep Improvement Association, Ohio will also be hosting an intermediate and advanced sheep shearing school scheduled for the weekend of July 27th and 28th from 8:30 am – 5:00 pm at the Dave Cable Farm in Hebron, Ohio. The school will be led by Doug Rathke, a professional sheep shearer from Minnesota. Doug is recognized both nationally and internationally for his shearing skills as he has represented the USA Shearing Team for the Golden Shears World Sheep Shearing Championships

six times. The intermediate and advanced sheep shearing school is intended for those shearers that are searching for additional skills, techniques, and guidance to improve their speed and efficiency of shearing. Over the course of the two day training. shearers will learn how to improve their shearing time by properly positioning the sheep, understanding the importance of shearer footwork, and reducing the number of shearing strokes used per animal. In addition, participants will learn how to sharpen their own combs and cutters as well as be exposed to different exercises that will help them prepare for each shearing event. Participants are expected to bring their own shearing machine (electric or shaft driven). The cost to attend is \$175, which includes a meal for both days.

Ohio Forage and Grassland Council Tour to Complement Ohio Sheep and Hay Day 2019

On Friday, July 12 the Ohio Forage and Grassland Council (OFGC) will offer a farm tour beginning in Jackson County and traveling through Ross and Vinton Counties to sheep farms in South Central Ohio. This tour will take place the day before Ohio Sheep and Hay Day at the Jackson Agricultural Research Station on Saturday, July 13.

The tour will depart from the Red Roof Inn (1000 Acy Ave, Jackson, OH 45640) at 9:00 a.m and head Northwest to Chillicothe for the first farm stop at Pastured Providence Farmstead at 3316 Chapel Creek Rd, Chillicothe, OH 45601.

Pastured Providence Farmstead is home to Paul and Heather Dorrance, their children, livestock, and pastures. Paul is a veteran of the United States Air Force and Heather previously was a pediatric occupational therapist. Now they are full-time farmers and parents. Passionate about healthy, local food, and a fullfilling life, they are dedicated to producing all-natural products for consumers inculding lamb, beef, pork, poultry, honey, maple syrup and more. They raise St. Croix sheep for the purpose of producing 100% grass-fed lamb.

After a BBQ lunch in Chillicothe, the group will proceed Southwest to Vinton to the farm of Scott Payne at 303 Coal Valley Rd. Vinton, OH 45686.

Scott works for Ohio State University as the farm manager of the Jackson Agricultural Research Station. At the station they have a flock of Katahdin sheep and he runs the same breed at home on reclaimed strip-mined pasture ground near the Jackson/Vinton county line. Along with the sheep, Scott and his wife Jamie are raising two children of their own on the farm.


The tour will end back at the Red Roof Inn at 4:30 p.m.
